It appears that we are all set for the A-BF and 17 Mile Blaylock Creek Fun Run on Saturday, January 5th, 2008. Coffee, a warm fire and registration will be available beginning at 06:30 in the Big Fork Community Center. No entry fee, no t--shirt, no awards. However, the toughest marathon course east of the Rocky Mountains will satisfy the thirst of our addicted A-BF veterans*

Eight mountains down and eight mountains back for the marathoners. Five mountains down and five back for the fun runners. All cross the Little Missouri River and Blaylock Creek along with many other small streams.

The marathon is for experienced ultra runners. Please, no first time marathoners or first time trail runners.

Any runner that has not completed a trail run or marathon should register for the 17 miles Fun Run this year

Should the roads be unsafe to travel due to ice or snow the event will be cancelled. However, if you get to downtown Big Fork safely the event is a go regardless of the temperature. Should there be ice or snow on the mountaintops, the event may be modified to a shorter ten mile run over one mountain (Missouri Mountain)

We should have excellent communications between checkpoints and the base station since the Ouachita Mountain Amateur Radio Association will be joined by Steve Porter's group, the Central Arkansas Radio Emergency Network.

Aid Stations are all set with Road 25(3.6/22) staffed by TATUR; Road 106(8.6/17.7 mile by AURA and 13.1 mile by Steve Chaney and Don Higgins.

This will be my last year as the Coordinator. Hopefully, someone will take the baton and keep this challenging event going in the future.

* Although this is a no entry fee event, participants are encouraged to make a donation to the Big Fork Community Center. A suggested figure is \$5.00. 100% of your donation goes to the Community Center.

The next morning he said goodbye and sat off to find the Arkansas Traveller 100 and his new beginning,


Epilogue
